Interesting Finds in a Junk Box – No Value Just Interesting by Diane Jarvis

I went through the box of ephemera I purchased at the November meeting and found a couple of things I would like to share. The box had a lot of mail from or to Gordon Speers so I am assuming that the previous owner of this box had purchased a bin from the sale of Gordon's collections.

Firstly I found a postcard from Switzerland with a picture of Lucerne. The card is dated and the cancel both show 1980 as the year it was mailed. I thought it didn't look right so I kept looking at it then realized the issue.



The card was mailed in Switzerland with one Swiss stamp and one Canadian stamp. I guess a Swiss postal worker didn't see this discrepancy any more than a Canadian postal worker would have done.

In the box there also were two letters written by Gordon Speers to two armed forces personnel. In the letters that he wrote he said he had gotten their names and addresses from his local stamp club and had been told they would like to receive mail. So he diligently sent off his letters to these two service people to the Multinational Medical Unit in Kandahar, Afghanistan. But unfortunately these personnel had already returned to Canada. The Armed Forces, instead of forwarding the letters to the intended recipient they returned them to sender.



For me that was sad. Why weren't they forwarded to the recipient at their new address? On the bottom of the letters is an address for a base in Belleville, Ontario but I am not sure if that was added by George. If so he may have sent new letters to them.

Have any of you written to someone like this? I think it would be interesting but don't know how to get in touch with anyone in the beginning. Is this something we could take on as a club? 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Registration or special delivery or both, if de-sired, are applicable to air mail letters and insur-ance may be secured on any article of air mail eligible therefor.

All matter intended for transmission by air must be plainly marked "Via Air Mail" or "par avion" and fully prepaid. It is recommended that distinctive envelopes; specially printed in colours for air mail, be used if possible. Such envelopes are to be obtained at most stationery stores at

are to be obtained at most stationery stores at small cost. For further information regarding air mail either within or outside of Canada, please consult your Postmaster. POST CARDS Post cards for delivery in Canada, Great Britain, and other places in the British Empire, France, Spain, and places in North and South America-two cents each (if they bear written communica-tions). tions).

Reply post cards for delivery in Canada, Great Britain and other places in the British Empire, France, Spain, the United States, and all other places in North and South America—four cents

each (if they bear written communications). Post cards for delivery in all other countries-three cents each (if they bear written communications)

Reply post cards for delivery in all other countries six cents each (if they bear written communications).

Single reply cards bearing on the face the words "Business Reply Card" and prepaid one-half cent postage. These cards must be sent out as en-closures with matter mailed in quantity addressed to places within Canada, and the speculative ele-ment as to a reply must be present when they are ment as to a reply must be present when they are used. Any organization using these reply cards must have its name and address printed on the lower right-hand half of the face and must have matter (with or without blanks to be filled in) printed on the reverse side of the card.

Double reply cards bearing on the first half one cent postage and on the reply half one-half cent postage. The first half must have printed matter on it and the cards used under the same conditions as the one-half cent business reply earde cards.

Almanac Stamp of 1765 or 1766

The Stamp Act, passed by British Parliament in 1765, often cited as one of the immediate causes of the American Revolution, was, in fact, a tax. It was levied on American paper used for legal, official or everyday useful documents: ship's papers, business licenses, calendars, declarations, inventory, etc. —even playing cards. The "stamp" was applied to paper to denote that the tax had been paid. While the money demanded by the act was quite low and the act was repealed the following year, the damage was done.

The colonies were incensed at the notion that they could be taxed by anyone outside their elected assemblies. Mob violence and intimidation followed, forcing stamp tax collectors to resign their positions and driving away ships carrying stamp papers at seaports. Colonial orators, like Patrick Henry, as well as newspapers, seized on the issue of English tyranny taking the form of taxation without representation, building the wave to revolution some 10 years later.
